

A Visit to the John Paul II Seminary

On January 12, Grand Knight Terence Ryan and Chancellor Joe Myers accompanied me down to Taylor Street, NW to the new Blessed John Paul II Seminary to meet with Monsignor Rob Panke, who serves as its founding rector. Monsignor, a former classmate of Joe Myers at nearby Catholic U, gave us a VIP, all-access tour of the beautiful "House of Formation," where 30 young men will begin their vocational discernment. The building, which the archdiocese has owned for years, was completely gutted and renovated. The chapel, dedicated to Mary, mother of the church, is its stunningly beautiful center-

piece. The chapel is adorned with handcarved statues from Italv, as well as other artisan works, including the alter and ambo used by Pope Benedict XVI when he said mass at Nationals Park during the papal visit here. Certainly, its rarest and most prized possessions are two relics from Blessed Pope John Paul II. The first is a blood-stained piece of his cassock from the 1981 assassination attempt in Saint Peter's Square. The other is an

amice the pope wore saying Mass. Monsignor joked that you need a Cardinal to get those and fortunately, we do.

As our tour proceeded toward the lower level, we settled in for a delicious lunch in their bright and comfortable dining room. Luckily, both of the seminarians our council is supporting were available to join us. We had a great conversation and learned a little about each of the men. One is a graduate of GW University in Foggy Bottom and the other is the son of a career Army man who hails from Los Angeles. Our lunch culminated with Grand Knight Ryan presenting each seminarian with a check, which

they were most grateful and appreciative to receive and thankful for our support.

The vocations program is a critically important part of what our council and the order does. All councils are asked to support at least one seminarian per Columbian Year. Rock Creek Council is blessed to be able to support both of Msgr. Panke's men, plus two more seminarians studying elsewhere, for a total of four. The seminarians we support are chosen by the faculty based upon need. A small stipend doesn't cover all expenses, but it does help

to defray some of the costs for students who otherwise could not afford to continue their studies. For those who don't know, each and every Knights of Columbus meeting concludes with a Prayer for Vocations. Please pray for theses men we support and for those who may be called in the future.

The afternoon was both an enriching and powerful experience for all of us. To be able to see a Catholic seminary from the inside is not a luxury

most Catholics are afforded. We are quite fortunate to have this facility right in our backyard, just as many across the country are struggling and even closing their doors. I am proud of our vocations work and know that the relationship we've formed with Monsignor Panke and his seminarians will grow stronger in the months and years to come. He now knows that the Knights of Rock Creek Council can be counted on to help meet current and future needs, as well as a heavy dose of kind thoughts and prayers for him and those men who would be priests.

Pro-Life Mass

On Wednesday, February 15, the State Council is sponsoring a pro-life Mass at St. Rose of Lima Church (11701 Clopper Rod, Gaithersburg) at 7:30 pm. Msgr. Mark Brennan, pastor of St. Martin of Tours, will be the celebrant, while Fr. Marcel Guarnizo, an associate at St. John Neumann, will be the after-Mass speaker. Fr. Marcel was one of the first priests ordained in Russia after the fall of the Berlin Wall. He is a pro-life sidewalk counselor, who can be found each Monday morning near LeRoy Carhart's abortion facility. Light refreshments will be served. A special guest is Mr. Andrew Glenn, coordinator of 40 Days for Life in Germantown.

New KofC Survey

A survey released on January 23, during the March for Life, showed that 79 % of Americans believe that abortion should be significantly restricted. This includes 51% who believe that abortion should never be allowed or only in cases of rape, incest or to save the mother's life.

Most people (84%; and even 80% of pro-choice supporters) believe that laws can be constructed that protect the health of the mother and the life of the child.

The survey was commissioned by the Supreme Council and conducted by the Marist College Institute for Public Opinion.

Another four years of proabortion President Obama will mean allowing him to load the Supreme Court

with more people like Elaine Kagan and Sonia Sotomayor, to rule in favor of killing more babies, plus continuing the prevention of defunding Planned Parenthood.

According to the Susan B. Anthony List, the big abortion-centered business, Planned Parenthood, "has received a sickening half billion taxpayer dollars in their last fiscal year." With this huge federal subsidy, 91% of their activities are in abortions, for which they also charge for their service. Although there are a number of states that have legislated to defund this organization of over \$61.7 million

dollars, a great deal of taxpayers money is still poured into their pockets. Private donations, however, from individuals, corporations and foundation have shown a reduction of 28%.

Some abortion groups are criticizing the Salvation Army for its stand that, "Human life is sacred and all people should be treated with dignity and respect." They too accept that the moment of fertilization is the start of a human life.

The Archdiocese of Baltimore had criticized Susan G. Komen Race for the Cure in Hunt Valley this past October because they donated over \$600,000 to Planned Parenthood. Although Komen raises money for Breast Cancer, which has tremendous merits, their good could be wiped out due to their support for abortions. They claim that they are also in favor of embryonic stem cell research and do not support studies showing that

abortion is a contributing cause of breast cancer. I feel sure that Planned Parenthood does not give money to any other organizations. To account for this, the Komen Maryland states that they send over two and a half million to their national office. This may be where the problem lies. We may learn more about this in the near future. Baltimore is not the only one that does not support Komen of the Cure. They are only one of a dozen that finds fault with this organization.

Rock Creek Council had a number of young people from two areas come to stay with us at the Council for five days and four nights so that they could participate in the March for Life and its ancillary activities. We thank they for showing themselves in favor of saving the lives of so many babies. For now, all I can ask of you is to keep the pro-life movement in your prayers. God Bless.

Words from the Bishops

On January 20, the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) issued a mandate that virtually all employer-provided health plans must cover sterilization and contraception services, with some contraceptives acting as abortifacients. There is no exemption for church-related hospitals, schools or charitable organizations. The U.S. bishops have spoken out:

Archbishop Jose H. Gomez of Los Angeles: "the government is imposing a narrow, radically individualistic idea of religion." He called on all Catholics to "step up to their responsibility for the Church's mission, " and "to be leaders in helping to shape the values and moral foundations of America's future."

Daniel Cardinal DiNardo, archbishop of Galveston-Houston: "Never before in our U.S. history has the federal government forced citizens to directly purchase what violates our beliefs." He continued, "At issue here...is the survival of a cornerstone constitutionally protected freedom that ensures respect for conscience and religious liberty."

Bishop David A. Zubik of Pittsburgh: "Kathleen Sebelius (Health and Human Services Secretary) and through her, the Obama administration, have said 'To Hell with You' to the Catholic faithful of the United States." He added that the administration has damned Catholics' religious beliefs, religious liberty and freedom of conscience.

CHURCH ACTIVITIES REPORT

According to Father Benedict Groeschel, C.F.R., Director of Trinity Retreat Center, The Cardinal Newman Society is "the best, most effective groups for: (a) identifying the leading problems at Catholic colleges, (b) bringing these areas of concern to public scrutiny, and (c) effecting positive change." There are currently only 21 loyal Catholic colleges. I do not have this list, which Father Groeschel speaks of, but hopefully, I will be able to find more information by writing to him or to the Cardinal Newman Society. I believe that this information would be of interest to some of you. I know that I have mentioned in the past my disappointment with some of the colleges.

Supreme Chaplain Bishop William Lori has recently asked Congress to protect "religious freedom" in this country. He stated that this is our country's first freedom listed in the Bill of Rights. He said that the First Amendment states "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof." I cannot understand what part of this statement the President or Congress does not understand.

As stated in an article found in a recent Supreme newsletter, "The Declaration of Independence boldly proclaimed as a self-evident truth that our inalienable rights are 'endowed by our Creator' – not by the state." This means that our Church has the right to tell us Catholics to defend the Defense of Marriage Act and to prevent laws permitting abortions. As fellow Knights of this Council, and truly all members of the Knights of Columbus, we should all

uphold the teaching of the Church and do whatever it takes to see that marriage as we know it will not be altered.

You may have come across this article in the papers by Patrick Crerar, associate rector of Grace Episcopal Church in Alexandria. He objected to Michelle Boorstein, who stated that an Anglican parish "converted" to Catholicism. It is his belief that it was incorrect to use the term converted since he says that all Anglicans are Angle-Catholics and that this parish was only moving over to the Roman Catholic faith. To support this, he says that that at their weekly service their members proclaim their faith as "one holy catholic and apostolic Church." This statement does not differ from what we say at each Mass. However, here the word "catholic" means universal, which does not have the same concept when we call or others call us "Catholic." I believe that what surprises me is that this individual is an associate rector.

There is a church in Minnesota called Compassion of Christ Church and they claim to have women Roman Catholic priests (this is with a capital "C"). The group states that they have about 70 female priests throughout the United States. These women priests are not part of the Catholic Church for their ordination is not valid. In fact, the Vatican has come out and said that women who sought ordination and bishops who ordained them would be excommunicated. God Bless.

Council Hosts Pro-Life Pilgrims

For the 11th consecutive year, our Council welcomed Right-to-Life Pilgrims to our Hall, so that they could attend the many pro-life activities scheduled in conjunction with the annual March for Life at the National Mall. There were 16 pilgrims, nine from College Station and seven from Albuquerque. The group, which arrived Friday evening and departed Tuesday morning, January 20-24, consisted of high school and college male and female students. As well as five chaperones.

During their visit, they toured several historic memorials and landmarks and attended the following pro-life activities: reciting the Rosary and Divine Mercy Chaplet at the Planned Parenthood facility in Northwest Washington; visiting the Franciscan Monastery of the Holy Land; joining in the Adoration with the Poor Clares of Perpetual Adoration; attending the Vigil Mass at St. Matthew's Cathedral; participating in the Mass for Life at the National Shrine of the Immaculate conception; saying night prayers with Bishop Vann and group from the Diocese of Fort Worth; and participating in the Rally and March for Life on the Mall. Each evening upon returning to our Hall, they gathered in the Fireplace Lounge to engage in their night program, which consisted in praying the liturgy of the hours, religious music, and reflections on the day's events. Grand Knight Terence Ryan welcomed the group and gave them a "pep" talk.

We thank the following Council members who volunteered to stay overnight to monitor the evening activities and to provide any needed assistance to the pro-life group: Tom Stallone, Paul Eder, Kevin Giblin, and Joe Myers. Tom was kind enough to drive a few chaperones to the local Giant Supermarket on Friday evening so that they could purchase groceries and lunch-meat to make sack lunches for the excursions. Vince Bunag volunteered to provide continental breakfast early Saturday morning. Without the help of the volunteers it would have been impossible to accommodate the pro-life pilgrims. Matt Gill, the Pilgrimage Leader, offered his sincere thanks to the Council for the lodging and hospitality!



The Odyssey of Vince and Glenda Bunag

As most of you are aware, Vince Bunag and his lovely wife Glenda are departing to retire in their native Philippines this month. They both have labored faithfully and long for the council during the past 28 years. They will be missed.

When they left the Philippines with their four children, the country was in political chaos and economic uncertainty.

The country had been under a dictator for two decades. Martial law was in effect, civil rights were suppressed, and abuses, murder and crime were rampant. There were major demonstrations daily in the streets. The country was on the brink of civil war.

Vince and Glenda came to Maryland to start a new life and give their children better opportunities and security. It was not easy leaving family and friends behind, and having to adjust to a new culture, environment and lifestyle. Owning extensive land that had to be abandoned, they came with little money and without jobs.

A friend from the Philippines allowed them to stay in his home until they could get settled. After Sunday Mass, shortly after they arrived, PGKs Neal Conway and Fred Seelman were recruiting members and asked Vince, who was a 2nd degree member, to transfer to Rock Creek. He did, and soon took the 3rd and 4th degrees. Neal Conway, who was president of the Kay Cee Club, gave Vince his first job in this country as a janitor to clean the council hall and set up tables and chairs for social events.

Vince quickly became active in the council and was in charge of monthly socials. From 1987 to 1989, he gave weekly ballroom dance lessons, and introduced monthly international festivals with dinner, music and colorful folk dances from around the world.

For the next 24 years, Vince and Glenda annually ran the New Year's Eve Party, St. Patrick's Dance, Night in Roma, Oktoberfest, and yearly trips to Atlantic City. From 1985 to 2009, Vince was chairman of various council fund raising activities, including the Car Raffle and Tootsie Roll Drive, as well as Membership Recruitment. On weekends during these drives, he would personally solicit at

the seven churches the council then served, as well as outside of supermarkets. His efforts were highly successful. For eight consecutive years, the council was the top seller of car raffle tickets in the state, and twice was awarded Star Council for membership.

Vince also served as a KofC usher at the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception and, for ten years, he and Glenda made pilgrimages to Lourdes, France serving sick and handicapped visitors from different parts of the world. Each year, upon their return, they distributed Lourdes water and rosaries to

Council members, friends, and neighbors who were sick and in need of prayers.

They were recognized many times for their efforts. Vince was awarded a KofC watch eight times as the state's top Tootsie Roll fund raiser, chosen as the Council's Knight of the Year, received a Lifetime Achievement Award, and is an Honorary Life Member of the Order. With Glenda, they have been selected as the Council's Family of the Year twice and as Model Family of Rock Creek Council in 2005.

Vince and Glenda, you will be missed, but know that you leave with our fraternal love. May God Bless You – *May Diyos Sa lyo!*

REFLECTIONS ON A HERO

No Longer Mary's Land

Maryland provided the fertile soil from which the seed of Catholicism in America sprouted, flourished and spread across the nation. It was founded as a haven for Catholics to practice their faith uninhibited; where one of the first acts of the first settlers was to celebrate Mass; where the only Catholic to sign the Declaration of Independence – Charles Carroll of Carrollton – resided; where the bishops met in 1884 to create the *Baltimore Catechism* which became the primary text for educating youth for some 80 years; where the first native-born saint, Elizabeth Ann Seton, established the first Catholic school in the nation.

The glorious history of its religious leadership in America reflects Maryland of the past. Today, the soil is rancid. For several decades, too many Catholics let their faith go unnourished, and let the materialism of the world take

precedence over their spiritual heritage. Presently, only 72 percent of Catholics nationwide are certain there is a God; only 56 percent consider religion very important in their lives; only 42 percent attend Mass at least on a weekly basis.

Holy Face Church, October 22, 2011

The result is that currently Maryland has one of the highest rates of abortion in America, 50 percent above the national average; allows the killing of children in the womb to the point of delivery; has tolerant regulations regarding abortion facilities and those who perform abortions; has attempted to enact restrictions on pregnancy care centers; supports through state appropriations embryonic stem-cell research; and where a legislative priority of the governor is to legalize same-sex marriage.

The soil must be rejuvenated through governmental, social and spiritual efforts so that the culture of the state can once again be hospitable to the dogmas, doctrines and practice of the Catholic faith. This will take an all-out effort by everyone and every organization that is concerned about the sanctity of life.

All is not lost, however. There have been a few recent favorable actions. On January 13, 2012, the Maryland Department of Health and Mental Hygiene published draft

regulations that would require abortion facilities to meet standards similar to ambulatory surgical centers, rather than as doctors' offices. While aimed at improving the quality of health care for women, many abortion facilities may be hard pressed to meet these requirements and close.

Another recent event was the arrest of late-term abortionist Steven Brigham, who is indicted with eleven counts of murder resulting from his abortion practice in Elkton. This is the first time that an abortionist has been charged with a capital crime under the state's Unborn Victims of Violence Act enacted in 2005, which may deter others from performing late-term abortions.

In addition to governmental action, the hearts and minds of people must be changed to support life at all stages. One effort of the Knights of Columbus in Maryland is the

erection of Cemeteries of the Innocents as potent visual reminders of the effects of abortion. These displays usually consist of 721 crosses, which is about the number of children aborted nationally every hour in a 40-hour work week, since

Roe v. Wade was passed in 1973. It also is the number of children aborted weekly in Maryland. Since the cemeteries were begun in 2004, over 200 have been displayed in various parts of the state, often along heavily traveled roads.

Another important action is to provide prayerful, public witness before abortion facilities. The Knights of Columus supports, and many Knights participate in, national movements such as 40 Days for Life and Life Chain, as well as local gatherings.

Pregnancy Care Centers are often one of the first places that a women with an unwanted pregnancy turns to for assistance. To strengthen these front-line facilities, the Knights in Maryland have created linkages between the centers and its local councils to help provide the assistance the staffs may require. Among other means of assistance, the Knights are donating ultrasound machines to some of the centers, as they recognize the tremendous effect an

ultrasound image can have on a woman's decision to choose life.

Although the fight for life is being waged in a secular world, it is really a spiritual battle. Prayer is critical. Without a strong spiritual effort, the rest will not be successful. Hence, the Knights conduct monthly prolife Masses throughout the state, encourage prayer services in connection with three circulating icons of Our Lady of Guadalupe, and are instituting a major campaign to say the rosary for the unborn, among other activities.

Catholics who were youngsters in the 1950s or before, living in urban areas, such as Baltimore, New York, Philadelphia, or Chicago, were raised in a culture that supported the faith on virtually every front. Catholic schools were plentiful and inexpensive; churches were well attended; parish organizations would boycott local stores that displayed salacious magazines; nuns in habits were common; priests would visit homes to bless them; restaurants and eateries would advertise nonmeat meals on Fridays; and even the vocabulary of the young was sprinkled with Latin phrases as most boys became altar servers.

While we do not expect this social environment to return in our lifetime, a culture based on Christian principles can exist. When churches are once again an integral part of community life, people regularly attend religious services, family is given primacy over individual well-being, and marriage is considered indissoluble and allowed only between one man and one woman, the nation will be developing a collective conscience in line with Christian principles. This will guide the way people think, act, and conduct their lives, both privately and publicly. Then, leaders in business, the media and government -- and others who make economic and political decisions in conformity with the general ethos of the people -- will operate within a Christian framework. And Maryland may once again be Mary's Land.

Your Action Needed on Proposed Abortion Facility Regulations

The Maryland Department of Health and Mental Hygiene has proposed draft regulations that would require abortion centers to be regulated as outpatient surgical centers, rather than as physicians' offices. This would impose much stricter requirements on the centers, better protect the health of women who choose abortion, and possibly cause some of the centers to close. It is crucial that the Department receive POSITIVE feedback in favor of the regulations because there will be efforts by the abortion industry to prevent the regulations from being enacted. Comments must be filed by February 13. The Maryland Catholic Conference has made it easy to do so. 
